

DEVOTION

"Jesus reached out his hand and touched the man, "I am willing, "he said. "Be clean!" And immediately the leprosy left him." - Luke 5:13

In those days, people with leprosy had to live away from the rest of the community as outcasts, not permitted to approach others. This man was bold to approach Jesus. By declaring "If you are willing", in verse 12, he was demonstrating his faith. "If it is in the Lord's will", is a statement of faith in the one who can heal.

I love how Jesus interacted with this man. He moved towards and responded by touch. In those days no one would dare go near someone with leprosy, let alone have physical contact with them. Jesus reached out in love and touched the man and responded to his faith. I've personally sat with

leprosy patients, held their hands and prayed with them, reflecting that I'm the one who has been blessed by their company.

Stigma is still a real problem in Nepal and people with leprosy are often treated as outcasts. INF has a long history of welcoming people with leprosy into their care, treatment and rehabilitation. INF is also moving towards people with leprosy, by establishing a community outreach team to educate and screen people in areas of high-leprosy prevalence.

COMMUNITY COHESION FIGHTS LEPROSY

The discovery of leprosy in Aathkhet Village sparked fear and stigmatisation among residents. Neighboring villagers avoided the area. But the community of Taghring village took measures to address the issue, collaborating with the Marsyangdi Rural Municipality, INF and Green Pasture Hospital and Rehabilitation Centre (GPHRC). Together they organised an awareness campaign and skin camp.

During the event, health workers, educators, students and 135 villagers participated in an informative session on leprosy. A total of 74 were screened for the disease, with 39 suspected cases identified. It dispelled misconceptions and fostered community empathy and understanding.

Community cohesion improved and the stigma decreased. Local leaders and villagers were grateful

for the support, acknowledging the role of INF and GPHRC. INF and community leaders continue to monitor with a reported positive shift in attitudes towards affected individuals. It is a testament to community-oriented initiatives.

In 1994, I was called to work with Mission Aviation Fellowship in Mt Hagen, Papua New Guinea, and was its finance manager for the next five years.

In 2001, my family and I left Australia for Pokhara, Nepal, where I worked in finance for INF. During this time, I was able to focus on training and equipping staff, support Himalayan Ministries with Cindy Perry and Anne Herr, and be a part of the handing over of INF as a mission to the Nepali churches in Pokhara.

Since returning to Sydney in 2006, I've had senior roles with Bible League, Anglicare and Churches of
